Rocks Fall and Not Everyone Dies

This year's pawpet show was a wonderfully magic tale in the style of "A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court". It told the story of Marcus, a socially inept archaeologist fox, and Vinnie, a go-lucky party rat, who after discovering a hidden temple of the goddess Fortuna in the ruins of Pompeii end up in ancient times just mere hours before the eruption of Mount Vesuvius. Upon their arrival, they are immediately drawn into the struggle of two beautiful slave girls fighting against their cruel owner, the nobleman Caius Gavius Rufus.

The story was done using all the classical ingredients of an adventurous romp. The heroes get into trouble in a strange unfamiliar

world, escape from hostile locals, find unlikely allies, risk their lives to free a friend, and fall in love with an exotic stranger. All tried and true conventions of the genre, which lend a good pace to the plot with all the pieces neatly falling into place.

But this year's show was not pure escapism. It was also educational, informing the audience during the breaks about habits and culture of ancient Pompeii such as the institution of slavery, public bath houses, and even about sex and religion. Much of the humour in the play was achieved by anachronistic irony such as turning the gladiatorial games into a staged fighting event very much like modern day wrestling matches,

making the fans of various gladiator groups act like drunk football hooligans, waving flags and large foam hands and running through a list of the more cliche plot devices in the style of a video game describing them as "achievement unlocked". One of the most impressive parts of the production was the beautiful music done by Fox Amoore giving the show an epic flavour that a tale set in ancient Pompeii should have. There were also plenty of nods to previous pawpet shows like cameo appearances of the famous Meerkats, as well as a recurrence of the fan favourite "caution wet floor" sign. All in all, this year's production kept it simple, straight forward and solid which was the perfect approach to such a story. (cur)

The charity concert was without a doubt the second musical highlight of this convention. After the Rock'n'Rome concert thoroughly rocked the main stage the day before, quieter and more personal tunes could be heard yesterday at the Piano Bar. The tickets, priced at 5 Euros, were sold out, leaving no seat unfilled. Around 130 furs listened to the musical talents of Fox Amoore, Alexander James Adams and guest of honor, Peter S. Beagle.

Each musician brought their very own, distinct style into the concert, and while they only had a few hours to practice their performance, their songs managed to capture the audience within a heartbeat. Guest of Honor Peter S. Beagle proved that he is not just an immensely talented writer, but also quite comfortable with

It almost goes without saying that the concert finished with a standing ovation, followed by an ever growing chant of "One more!" from the audience. And it's not just the audience that did not want the concert to end: "Truly, playing with these gentlemen has been a highlight for this convention." said Mr. Beagle.

And if that weren't enough, all the money gathered for the concert goes to this year's charity. In combination with all the other charity efforts during the course of the con, over 10.000 Euros were collected for Far from Fear e.V., almost 4.000 Euros more than last year's charity. *(con)*

"First Time We Had a Code Black"

This year's Eurofurence has been a quiet one for the security staff - with one exception.

Chief of security Gyroplast is pleased with how Eurofurence went so far. "Generally, it has been a very calm and peaceful convention. Me and my deputy, Dhary, got almost six hours of sleep every night!"

The big exception was a fight that took place on Tuesday night, before the con had officially started. Three intoxicated attendees got into a quarrel at the piano bar, which later led to flying fists upstairs. All three were questioned by the police and the aggressors were sent home that same night, along with a third, separate person who had been over-drinking despite repeated warnings.

The incident on Tuesday was the first time that a Code Black emergency was declared. When this happens, all security guards - except for a bare minimum that keeps on guarding doors, etc. - are alarmed by radio and asked to hurry to the intervention zone. 'Team Offensive' then approaches the troublemakers while the defensive team evacuates guests from the danger zone.

Thankfully, things went a lot calmer from here. Besides the usual routine work, security staff also took the pleasant duty of guiding interested spectators around the lobby. "We don't discourage them from having a look," says Gyroplast. "Most of them are polite and friendly and the fursuiters generally enjoy the extra attention." (lux)
